A word from the CEO

Prevas has noticed that its customers are starting to recover and that the level of activity is higher than it was earlier this year. As a result, this quarter has been better for Prevas than the last one.

Prevas' vision to be a leader in its areas of operation has shown excellent results. In the Product Development business area, the company's position as leader in embedded systems has been further strengthened as a result of such things as having been designated the highest partnership status with National Instruments and Microsoft, as well as having won the 2009 Swedish Embedded Award. In the Industrial Systems business area, developments have been quite positive and significant steps have been taken primarily in the area of manufacturing-related IT solutions aimed at increasing our customers' competitiveness.

The Industrial Systems business area has done well in surviving the overall downturn in the economy and it continues to demonstrate its strength with an operating margin of 16.1 percent for the period.

The Product Development business area, which we assess as having been more seriously impacted during the spring than the overall IT market, has gradually improved. However, we still expect to encounter difficulties in this area throughout the rest of the year, primarily with consulting activities.

Although the market has stabilized in certain segments during the last few months, there are still overriding uncertainties. The start of new development projects is delayed. As I mentioned previously, I believe that the rest of 2009 will continue to be tough, but that we will see gradual improvements during 2010.

Sales

JANUARY - SEPTEMBER

Sales amounted to SEK 389.7 (455.7) million, which is a decrease of 14 percent. Organic sales declined by 17 percent. Sales per employee were SEK 817 (885) thousand. The total number of working days was 187 (190).

JULY - SEPTEMBER

Sales were SEK 109.9 (134.2) million, which is a decrease of 18 percent. 19 percent of the decline was organic. Sales per employee were SEK 245 (266) thousand. The total number of working days was 66 (66).

Income

JANUARY - SEPTEMBER

EBIT was SEK 0.0 (55.5) million, with a corresponding operating margin of 0,0 (12.2) percent. EBIT before depreciation was SEK 9.5 (65.2) million, with a corresponding profit margin before depreciation of 2.4 (14.3) percent.

Net income was SEK –0.9 (39.3) million Income for the period was brought down by SEK 4.0 million due to the costs associated with the action plan that Prevas started during the second quarter, which affected 18 employees in Sweden and 5 employees in Denmark. Excluding these costs, EBIT was SEK 4.0 (55.5) million, with a corresponding profit margin of 1.0 (12.2) percent.

The decline in income is primarily due to a worsening of the invoice rate for a large portion of our activities within the Product Development business area.

During the period, Prevas also had bad debt losses, which negatively impacted income by SEK 1.6 million.

JULY - SEPTEMBER

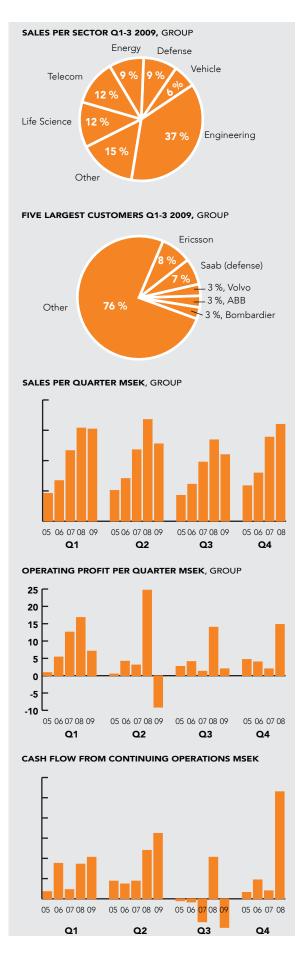
EBIT was SEK 2.0 (14.0) million, with a corresponding operating margin of 1.9 (10.4) percent. EBIT before depreciation was SEK 5.1 (17.3) million, with a corresponding operating margin of 4.7 (12.9) percent.

Net income was SEK 1.3 (10.1) million.

Cash flow and cash equivalents

Cash flow from continuing operations was SEK 19.2 (30.9) million for the period. At the end of the period, cash equivalents totaled SEK 12.6 (7.6) million, excluding bank overdraft facility. During the period, SEK 1.65 million was amortized. Total cash flow was affected by additional purchase price payments on prior acquisitions of SEK 4.6 million, restructuring costs of SEK 2.0 million and dividend payments of SEK 15.1 million.

During the period July-September, there was a negative effect on cash flow due to the vacation period.

Financial position

At the end of the period, equity was SEK 166.1 (164.0), which corresponds to an equity ratio of 60 (54) percent. Equity per share was SEK 16.44 (16.65).

Important events during the period

Select Alliance Partner to National Instruments

Prevas is the only Scandinavian company that has been selected as a Select Alliance Partner by the US company, National Instruments (NI).

NI's Select Alliance Partners use their expertise and profound knowledge of NI's products to build customized technical solutions. The customers are active within a range of different industries, such as telecommunications, defense, automotive and manufacturing. Together, NI and Prevas can offer customers high quality turnkey solutions based on graphic system design.

General agreement signed with GE Healthcare

For more than 15 years already, Prevas has been assisting GE Healthcare with their product development. This cooperation will now continue. Prevas has signed an agreement with GE Healthcare Bio-Sciences, which will be in effect through 2013. GE Healthcare Bio-Sciences has its head office in Uppsala and the company delivers solutions primarily in the area of protein separation and protein analysis to pharmaceutical companies and research institutions throughout the world.

General agreements

The combination of general agreements, large customers and unique expertise creates stability for Prevas. Important general agreements and continued cooperation are in place with such companies as ABB, Atlas Copco, Bombardier, Ericsson, FMV, GE Healthcare, Luftfartsverket, Maquet, Saab AB, SMHI, Stoneridge, Sveriges Radio and Volvo.

Important events subsequent to the end of the period

Prevas wins the 2009 Swedish Embedded Award

A sophisticated fireman's mask was awarded first prize in the Enterprise category when the Swedish Embedded Award was handed out at this year's Embedded Conference in Stockholm. Prevas and Interspiro won with their newly-developed communication system for fireman teams.

The fireman's mask is extremely easy to use and it enables communication between firemen that dramatically improves safety. This is important in an environment where visibility can be as little as one to two meters. The system consists of portable electronic units that are located on each fireman's headgear. When firemen in a team talk, a radio channel is opened to allow contact with the others in the team. Simultaneously, other sounds such as breathing and external interference are filtered out. It is also possible to open links to and from the team via an external radio system. For example, the leader of the rescue team can contact the team from another location.

Market trends

Leadership in the area of Industrial IT

During the first three quarters of the year, the market has been weak for the Industrial Systems business area and there has been a noticeable lack of significant investments to improve productivity. However, customers are indeed planning to make such investments, but they are delaying them until the recovery in their own markets is more noticeable. We have noticed an interest in certain areas, but this has primarily been smaller initiatives where the return or potential improvements are easily identified. TAK/OEE (measuring effectiveness to achieve higher productivity) are relatively simple investments that make it possible to see how machinery is being utilized in a manufacturing facility. This is an area where Prevas is very active in assisting Nordic industry to become more efficient.

Because Prevas was able to quickly make adjustments from a time of prosperity to the economic downturn, it has been possible to maintain a high profit margin. The conversion from a project-driven to assignment-driven organization has now been made, while keeping a clear customer focus at all times. Here, we are participating in the planning process for the investments that our customers will be making once the upturn in the economy becomes more evident. For 2009, the Prevas Industrial Systems business area has thus focused on maintaining margins, rather than prioritizing growth.

The market prospects for investments in manufacturing-related IT solutions and industrial IT are assessed as being quite good. Once there are clear signs of a recovery, investments will again take off. Customers will greet the upturn in the market with more efficient internal IT processes. Manufacturing Execution Systems (MES) and Enterprise Manufacturing Intelligence (EMI) are the areas where we will see the most developments. The driving factors for new investments are the customer's own productivity in combination with their requirements for traceability and quality assurance. In certain sectors, regulatory requirements must also be considered, e.g. for reporting and monitoring of emissions.

Prevas works with many world-leading companies, such as ABB, AstraZeneca, Ericsson, Findus, Fresenius Kabi, ICA, Outokumpu Stainless, Rautaruukki, Sandvik, SSAB and Volvo.

Nordic leader for embedded systems

During the third quarter, the market for Prevas' Product Development business area stabilized. During the first half of the year, the market for embedded systems was more significantly impacted that the overall IT market. This trend has now been broken and Prevas has noticed that there is a large accumulated need to develop new products. Once the manufacturing industry starts making investments again, product development will be prioritized.

During the third quarter, Prevas continued its efforts to review the organization in order to adjust to the current market situation. However, it is confident about what the future will bring.

The difference between Prevas and other IT consulting firms is that Prevas is able to participate in the entire product life cycle – from initial concept, through support and maintenance. What gives Prevas an advantage over its competitors is that we are able to offer semi-finished platforms and modules with the accompanying building blocks in order to quickly adapt to the needs of our customers. Time-to-market is become increasingly important. This is an area where Prevas can significantly impact our customers' opportunities to gain important market share and ensure that they are prepared for when the economic situation changes.

Prevas highly values its network of world-leading technology partners. This network ensures that the company has access to cutting-edge technologies. Examples of such leading technology partners are Microsoft and National Instruments. During the period, Prevas strengthened cooperation with all of its general agreement customers. Among other things, this was achieved through training and support of our personnel, which demonstrates to our customers that we are willing to invest in them.

Prevas works with many world-leading companies, such as ABB, Atlas Copco, Bombardier, Danfoss, Ericsson, Maquet, Novo Nordisk, Saab, Vestas and Volvo.

Employees

During the period, the average number of employees was 477 (515), of which 354 (388) employees worked within the area of Product Development and 106 (109) worked in the area of Industrial Systems. In addition, there were 17 (18) employees in senior management and administrative positions. At the end of the period the company had 484 (554) employees and the percentage of women employees was 11 percent.

Employee stock options

The employee stock option program from 2002 came to an end during the period. As of 30 September 2009, there were no outstanding employee stock options.

Investments

The company made investments in fixed assets worth SEK 5.9 (7.0) million during the period. Of the total amount, SEK 3.8 (4.1) million was for machinery and equipment, while SEK 2.1 (2.9) million was for product development and intangible assets. In addition to this, goodwill increased by SEK 4.6 million related to additional purchase sum and currency translations related to prior acquisitions.

The Parent Company

JANUARY-SEPTEMBER

Sales amounted to SEK 320.6 (366.3) million and profit/loss after financial items was SEK -3.3 (35.1) million.

Risks and uncertainties

Prevas relies on certain guiding principles when it comes to managing risks in various parts of its business. Successful risk management is a continuous process conducted within the framework for operations management. It is an integral part of the everyday follow-up of the business. Examples of business and market related risks are: competition and downward pressure on prices, how our customers' businesses develop, bad debt losses, risks associated with the state of the market and fluctuations in exchange/interest rates.

The current downturn in the economy has affected Prevas' business areas differently. In the Product Development business area, there has been a decline in demand. However, in the Industrial Systems business area, demand has remained good.

Prevas actively monitors its customers' ability to pay. However, during the period it nevertheless incurred some bad debt losses.

Accounting principles

The year-end report for the Group was prepared in accordance with IAS 34, Interim Financial Reporting. In addition, the report was prepared in accordance with the Annual Accounts Act (1995:1554) and the Swedish Securities Market Act (2007:528), where applicable. The year-end report for the Parent Company was prepared in accordance with the Annual Accounts Act (1995:1554) and the Swedish Securities Market Act (2007:528). This conforms to the regulations in RFR 2.2, Accounting for Legal Entities.

The standards applicable to Prevas that came into effect as of 1 January 2009 have impacted the company as follows: changes to IAS 1 have affected the presentation of the report, but not how the reported amounts have been determined. The primary segments reported in the past correspond to the operating segments, as described in IFRS 8. Changes to IAS 23 require borrowing costs from 2009 to be included in investments. The effect on the financial statements is negligible. Changes to IAS 27 could affect how dividends from subsidiaries are reported.

Except for the changes mentioned above, the company has applied the same accounting principles and bases of calculation as in the most recent Annual Report.

Auditor's report regarding review of the interim report

Introduction

We have conducted a review of the summary financial information for Prevas AB (publ.) as of 30 September 2009 for the ninemonth period ending on that date. The Board of Directors and CEO are responsible for the preparation and presentation of this interim report in accordance with IAS 34 and the Swedish Annual Accounts Act. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on this interim report that is based upon our review.

Focus and scope of the review

We conducted our review in accordance with the Swedish Standard on Review Engagements SÖG 2410, "Review of Interim Financial Information Performed by the Independent Auditor of the Entity," issued by FAR. A review consists of making inquiries, primarily of persons responsible for financial and accounting matters, and applying analytical and other review procedures. A review is substantially more limited in scope than an audit conducted in accordance with Standards on Auditing in Sweden, RS, and other generally accepted auditing practices. The procedures performed in a review do not enable us to obtain a level of assurance that would make us aware of all significant matters that might be identified in an audit. Therefore, the conclusion expressed based on a review does not give the same level of assurance as a conclusion based on an audit.

Conclusion

Based on our review, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the accompanying interim financial information does not, in all material respects, accord with IAS 34 and the Swedish Annual Accounts Act for the Group, and the Swedish Annual Accounts Act for the Parent Company.
